- C4NC was founded in 2005 in Arlington, VA, under the auspices of Urban Strategies
- The Board of Directors has national representation in Washington, DC, Maryland, Virginia, Texas and Indiana
- C4NC has committed approximately \$14 million of funding to support all programs since 2005

Capacity Building

Hispanic Community Building Initiative (W.K. Kellogg Foundation):

Nine community organizations in six states received individualized trainings / capacity building on:

- Board development
- Organizational administration processes and systems
- Communications and marketing
- Staff/volunteer development

Hosted 12 meetings with national policy makers, government officials, other stakeholders to move toward effective policies that level the playing field for Hispanic-serving organizations.

African American Family & Community Restoration Program (Bradley Foundation):

Developed innovative ways to deliver social services in Wisconsin by supporting the Faith Partnership Network's continued efforts on refining and development of the African American Family and Community Restoration Program

- Developed and implemented site / social network
- Refined "Total-Assess" Toolkit



- Planned, developed and implemented pre-summit and summit on "Color of Child Welfare", with over 180 attendees

Navajo Nation (HHS Compassion Capital Fund):

Trained 27 tribal organizations "Build for Lasting Impact" in Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Arizona

Equipped nine tribal faith and community-based organizations to develop culturally appropriate and effective programs in the areas of leadership, organizational functioning, program development and outcomes, and community outreach.

Maternal-Child Health: A Dialogue for Strategic Planning

This project, funded by W.K. Kellogg Foundation, provided planning support for a national demonstration project to improve health promotion and increase the number and mix of organizations providing services and awareness in maternal health within the Hispanic community. Specifically, the project:

- Articulated and communicated to key stakeholders the maternal health needs within the Hispanic community;

- Identified those maternal health needs that can be best addressed by community and faith-based organizations;
- Identified barriers that prevent community and faith-based organizations' efforts to address maternal health issues in Hispanic communities; and
- Developed strategies for reducing barriers that prevent community and faith-based

organizations from effectively addressing the maternal health needs in their communities.

The project also hosted a 2-day Solutions Summit with 32 participants to discuss the role of community and faith-based organizations in improving maternal/child health, particularly with regard to breastfeeding within the Latino community.

Maternal-Child Health: Promoting Breastfeeding in Hispanic Communities

This project, funded by W.K. Kellogg Foundation, is scheduled to be implemented in 2013–2015 and will provide the tools and resources that will support Hispanic serving community and faith-based grass-roots organizations' efforts to promote, educate, and support the practice of exclusive breastfeeding and healthy lifestyles in the Hispanic community.

Project goals:

1. Provide increased accessibility to learnings, resources, and tools that promote breastfeeding in the Latino community.
2. In targeted areas, close the gap between current breastfeeding rates and the goals of the Surgeon General's Healthy People 2020.
3. Build sustainable programming models from a variety of environments that promote breastfeeding in Hispanic communities.
4. Disseminate learnings and discoveries on best practices that can improve breastfeeding and other areas of well-being in the Hispanic community.
